





ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Texas Best Practices

Successfully renewed our Texas Best Practices designation. Addison is one of only 36 departments in Texas to be awarded this designation!

ISO-Class 1

Addison continues to maintain a Class 1 rating with the Insurance Services Office. We are one of less than 100 departments in Texas to achieve this top-tier rating, which reflects superior fire protection and emergency services.

48/96 Schedule

Collaborated with Human Resources and Payroll to implement a work schedule for our operations members with an effective date of January 2025.

HEART Safe Community

Recognized as a HEART Safe Community by the North Texas Trauma Regional Advisory Council. Addison is one of only 11 recognized communities in the area and among over 600 nationwide. This designation celebrates our efforts in reducing the impact of heart disease and improving cardiac arrest survival rates.

Mission Lifeline Gold

Received, for the second year in a row, the American Heart Association's (AHA) designation Mission Lifeline Gold. Addison is one of 51 departments in Texas to earn this honor, which demonstrates exceptional care for heart attack patients and adherence to the highest AHA standards.

Fire Station Updates

With the efforts of the General Services department, several updates were made to our fire stations' infrastructure to include the replacement of the HVAC systems, a generator, and ceiling tiles.

AED Program

Enhanced the Town's Automated External Defibrillator (AED) program.



Pre-Cancer Screening

Provided the opportunity for eligible members to have an Esophageal Pre-Cancer screening conducted.

Council Support

Council approved the adoption of the 2024 International Fire Code (IFC); the purchase of a new Tractor Drawn Aerial, Addison's first ever Tiller; two LifePak 15 monitors; and the replacement of captial equipment Extrication Tools.

Staffing Study

Participated in a staffing study conducted by Matrix.

Life Saving Awards

Proudly presented the Phoenix Award to several members for their efforts in saving the lives of two individuals.








PLANS REVIEWED



SMOKE DETECTOR BATTERY REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

*Number of batteries installed are decreasing each year, as expected, due to the 10-year shelf life batteries we started using. In addition, we had six residents visit our fire stations to pick up a total of 38 batteries.



PUBLIC EDUCATION & ENGAGEMENT

In 2024, Prevention, Operations, and Emergency Management teamed up to provide more than **600** staff hours of Public Education and Community Engagement encounters.

















EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

In 2024 the Emergency Management (EM) division made strides in building and growing the program. This was the AFD's first full year to have a full-time Emergency Management Coordinator position.

> EM made progress in supporting community resiliency through providing educational materials at public outreach events, including Christmas in July and National Night Out, as well as sharing information on our website, the Town's newsletter, and the AFD's social media outlets.

> > Work continued on several plans including the Dallas County Hazard Mitigation Action Plan (HMAP), the Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP), and the Alert and Warning standard operating procedures. Council approved the renewal for signing-on to the Dallas County Emergency Management Plan, while we continue to develop an Addison specific plan.

In January, EM helped support the response to the MLK Weekend Arctic Freeze winter weather event, by assisting with coordination between departments, providing situation reports for Council, and updating the winter operations plan with feedback from key personnel. In May, the Outdoor Warning Sirens were activated for sustained high-speed winds, causing damage to trees and facilities in Town. EM provided coordination support and worked to gather documentation to seek public assistance reimbursement through FEMA. September was National Emergency Preparedness Month and Julie presented the status of the EM program to Council.

Emergency Management supported operations for Taste Addison, Kaboomtown and Oktoberfest; as well as participated in regional committees and exercises. In December, Julie was elected to the Regional Emergency Management (REM) workgroup, as Secretary.

Some exciting projects for 2025 include a full-scale exercise at Addison Airport, the renewal of a debris monitoring contract with the quad cities, and continued development of emergency plans and standard operating procedures.











DISPATCH TO ON SCENE AVERAGE RESPONSE TIME


